1. Goddess Saraswati

The festival Vasant Panchami
(Saraswathi Pooja) is celebrated
every year on the fifth day of माघ
Magha, a month in the Indian
calendar. On that day many young
children start their first day of schooling to learn the alphabets. Countries

and Myanmar revere Devi Saraswathi
as the goddess of education, music
and arts.

2. Autism Spectrum Disorder

The early signs of Autism in young children include the following:



Avoiding eye contact



Getting upset by minor changes in routine



Having little interest in other children or caretakers



Limited display of language (for example, having fewer words than peers or difficulty with use of words for communication)

Children or adults with ASD might not point at objects to show interest, nor look at objects when another person points at them. They have trouble relating to others or not having an interest in other people at all. They also have trouble understanding other people's feelings as well as talking about their own feelings, prefer not to be held or cuddled, might cuddle only when they want to, and appear to be unaware when people talk to them. Sometimes, they are very interested in people, but do not know how to talk, play, or relate to them. They end up repeating words or phrases said to them, or repeat words or phrases in place of normal language.

Diagnosis

A diagnosis of ASD now includes several conditions that used to be diagnosed separately, like autistic disorder, pervasive developmental disorder - not otherwise specified (PDD-NOS), high functioning Autism and Aspergers

Syndrome. These conditions are now all called Autism Spectrum Disorder.



There is no simple medical test for diagnosing ASD. Pediatricians identify deviations from expected behavior and development to suspect a diagnosis.

Simple screening tests / questionnaires used during routine healthcare visits may "flag" a child to be "at-risk" for ASD. The standard test for confirming a diagnosis of ASD is the "Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedules (ADOS)" developed in 2000. The diagnosis may also be made using criteria set forth in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders used by mental health professionals.

Causes and Testing

All the causes of ASD are not known as it is likely that there are many causes for it like environmental, biological, and genetic factors.

ASD can be a part of numerous genetic syndromes caused by **chromosomal** or

single gene mutations. While ASD occurs sporadically in most instances, siblings and other relatives may be affected in some families. Such syndromic and familial cases provide evidence of genetic predisposition to ASD.

Modern genetic testing technologies including chromosomal microarray

(CMA) and whole exome sequencing

(WES) analysis have identified several hundred specific mutations that are associated with ASD. Co-existence of intellectual disabilities and congenital malformations increase the likelihood that ASD has an identifiable genetic cause.

Using these methods about 30% to 35% of children are found to have a recognizable genetic cause for ASD. Therefore, genetic testing is recommended when a child is confirmed to have ASD.

Vaccines and ASD

Many parents are anxious about the wide-spread belief that Autism may be "caused" by childhood vaccines. This is a long standing concern and predates



the COVID-19 pandemic. The issue has been investigated and no scientific evidence has been found to indicate an association between **childhood** immunization and Autism.

Treatment

Currently, there is no cure for ASD.

However, research shows that
early intervention treatment services can
improve a child's development. Applied
Behavioral Analysis (ABA) therapy helps
children with ASD talk, walk, and interact with others. Therefore, it is important
to talk to your child's doctor as soon as
possible if you think your child has ASD or
other developmental problems.

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)


IDEA is a federal statute that says that children under the age of 3 years, who are at risk of having developmental delays including ASD may be eligible for services. These services are provided through an early intervention system that varies from state to state.

Parents can ask for ASD evaluation and services. In addition, treatment for symptoms, such as speech and language delays, do not need to wait for a formal ASD diagnosis.

In Summary

Autism Spectrum Disorder remains an important public health concern. The total costs per year for children with ASD in the United States was estimated to be between \$11.5 billion – \$60.9 billion (2011 US dollars). This significant economic burden represents a variety of direct and indirect costs, from medical care to special education to lost parental productivity. There is an ongoing need for research to better understand ASD and its prevention and treatment.

4. Kastaa Vishay – The Tricky Stuff Much Ado About Plastic

My archaeologist colleagues often talk about what they have found when looking at ancient sites: stone tools, arrowheads, rocks laid out in coastal areas to trap fish as the tide recedes. What will the archaeologists of the future find from us? Likely a toothbrush, or a water bottle, maybe some earphones, or microscopic fragments of a shopping bag.

Years ago, I remember watching the

"holiday movie "It's a Wonderful Life".

It was filmed in 1946. One of the characters invited another to join him in a burgeoning new industry i.e. plastics. I wonder if the writers were psychic and saw how ubiquitous plastic would be in our lives today. Plastic has many important uses, but some estimates are that about 50% of plastic is used only once and then thrown away!

As a marine ecologist, plastic waste is constantly in my mind, because so much garbage ends up in waterways, and eventually in the ocean and our bodies. Its impact ranges from large scale (the Great Pacific Garbage Patch, to individual scale (whales and sea turtles dying after ingesting plastic instead of their prey), to the tiniest of scales (microplastics in our health-conscious-



sea salt. I do my best to lead an environmentally-conscious life as it is my profession, after all. Yet plastic is still all around me – my pen, these computer keys, my clothing, the bins I use to carry my gear, the pots in my garden ... I could go on and on!

Some among us will remember India in the days before plastic. Unfortunately plastic is now as prevalent in India today as it is here – perhaps even more so. There has been an instance where I have struggled with a cow on the road in front of the Chitrapur Math, as I pulled a long piece of plastic out of her throat. But our elders and ancestors had a lot of the sustainability solutions that we need to bring back today, including to North America. India is beginning to make bold moves to reduce plastic waste. Our ancestral state of Goa banned the use of plastic bags and other single-use plastics years ago, and a process has recently begun to ban single-use plastics across India.

It can be a challenge to eliminate plastic from our lives entirely. We do live in a consumer-driven society where we find for sale the things the make and action we take is a vote. To refuse and reduce the use of plastic comes before recycling.

If you're looking for a new year's resolution, how about reducing the amount of plastic in your life?

Here are some ideas



Ask an elder to share an earth-friendly practice that they remember from India.



Carry a cloth or reusable bag with you whenever you go out. There are some made of parachute material that fold into a tiny ball.



Find your local recycling depot and see what they accept. Some will take soft and hard plastics, styrofoam, electronics, appliances and other items that are not picked up by curbside recycling programs.



Use glass containers with lids, or reusable beeswax paper instead of cling wrap.





Don't put your fruits and vegetables in those clear plastic bags. Is there any real harm to keeping them loose? Bring reusable mesh bags to gather up those handfuls of bhand or tendle.



We have an abundance of choice in the west. Choose to buy items that are not made of, or packaged in plastic. Ask your favorite stores to stock less wasteful products.



Support your local temple by sponsoring them to purchase stainless steel plates and cutlery, and a dishwasher.



Reuse or recycle any plastic bags that sneak their way into your life. Ziploc and other bags can be washed with soap and water, hung to dry and used multiple times.



Carry a refillable water bottle and avoid single-use beverage and snack containers. (Long live the tiffin carrier!)



Compost your food waste, so that you can reduce the amount of garbage you produce (particularly wet and stinky garbage), and use a paper bag in your garbage can. I keep vermicompost bins on my balcony as they are odorless.



Join or start a neighborhood litter clean-up effort to remove plastics out of our sewers and waterways.

In Canada, we have a national initiative with this regard called the Great Canadian Shoreline Cleanup.

Question:

The Konkan Railroad is nearly 500 miles of tracks and 69 stations connecting coastal families and businesses from Udupi to Mangalore, and beyond, by train. We all have those memorable moments on the train eating a certain food, visiting a special someone, traveling to a new place, meeting

a business contact, or simply enjoying the scenic beauty of our country. Close your eyes, take a deep breath, and relive your pleasant train memories all over again.

More than 23 million passengers ride India's trains each day, and so it is no surprise that some train routes and classes are notoriously overcrowded. There are typically 72 seats per car on a train, however people are often standing, hanging out the side, or maybe even dancing on the roof like in the music video Chaiya Chaiya. Now coming to the Kwiz, How many people must be in a train car to ensure that at least 3 of them have the same birthday?

You may assume that there are 366 (including February 29th) possible birthdays.



Answer:

The correct answer is 733. Let us assume there are 366 possible birthdays, so 2*366+1=733. Therefore, the total number of people on the train should be 733 to ensure that at least 3 of them have the same birthday. This is proved using the Pigeonhole Principle. Note that the exact birthdate is not specified.

This issue's Kwiz

Question:

Reduplication is a common feature of the Konkani language used to show quantity, relationship, action, emphasis, etc. Some examples of reduplication in Konkani are "don-don" meaning "two each", bha-bau" meaning "brothers", "vag-vagi" meaning "quickly", and my brother's favorite Konglish reduplication, "doub-double".

Used in a sentence: His birthday and promotion on the same day called for a doub-double celebration! Now let's define a new reduplication called "speci-special". A collection of n numbers is called speci-special if their sum and product are equal. For example, n=2, the collection of numbers 2 and 2 is speci-special because 2+2=2*2=4. Another example, n=3, the collection of numbers 1,2, and 3 is speci-special because 1+2+3=1*2*3=6. In fact, for every positive integer n, it can be shown that there is a unique collection of n numbers that is specispecial.

In general, what is the collection of n numbers that is speci-special? That is, find a collection of n numbers al,a2,...,an that satisfies the property al+a2+...+an= al*a2*...*an. Investing in the youth from the community, enriching them with life and personality development skills, setting up peer groups and peer networking and making training integral to the scholarship scheme have given desired results.

Drawing parallels to the world-class facilities that Infosys setup in Mysuru and Mangaluru, where future IT personnel were trained in a corporate atmosphere with commensurate facilities, Mr T. V Mohandas Pai said the hostel at WKC has had the same effect on future generations from the community. Staying at nice training facilities will help bring about confidence in students to aspire for a better quality of life and work hard to achieve the same.

The VKSSF Alumni Association (VAA) has been set up to train future generations of leaders from within the



Konkani speaking community. While the elders from the community have been shouldering the activities at WKC so far, a plan of action will be drawn up to ensure that the VAA carries forth the vision for the community in the days ahead. "The WKC will also act as a rallying point for the Kharvi, Kudubi and Siddi communities who share the Konkani lineage", Mr T. V Mohandas Pai said.

Inaugurating the decennial celebration, chief mentor of Kshamata, Mr. Ullas Kamath said, "The hostel has served as a focal point to help realize Mr. T V Mohandas Pai's vision for an empowered Konkani community by the year 2030. The hostel has helped spread positive vibes among youths of the community who must make optimal use of various training imparted to them at the WKC for a better future.

The fact that the hostel is also serving as a training centre for other underprivileged youth is worth emulating".

Citing examples of how the KSHAMATA UGetin Training Programme has
changed the lives of students who
have undergone this training, Mr. Ullas
Kamath said, "The day is not far off
when similar training facilities will be
set up in places such as Bengaluru,
Mysuru, New Delhi and even in the USA
where most of the VAA scholars are
presently working and bringing the
name to the community. This will ensure that the vision of T V Mohandas
Pai for an empowered community
bears fruition".

Mr. Sandeep Shenoy, the VAA patron, citing the recent success of platform companies such as Nykaa and Zomato said that WKC has provided a similar platform for all Konkani speaking students to launch themselves.

Noting that WKC is yet to fully realize its potential of empowering students


The newly elected Board of Trustees took charge of the Konkani Bhas Ani Sanskriti Prathistan for the period 2021-24



Paraphrasing the life of a great Konkani Hero

9. Basti Vaman Shenoy

Here are some of the great things this great man did in one life.

It may not be much compared to what some other Konkani stalwarts might have achieved in their lives, but, when you consider some of the facts of his life it's inspiring. Only one of his parents reached up to 3rd grade in academics and the other never went to school, but this guy graduated from high school and never had a shot at college. In the Bantwal of the 1950s, that was a big achievement worth throwing a graduation party.

But there was no dearth of the proofs about the leadership in his veins. He was a complete package. There was very little in this world that he didn't get involved in while he was in and around his birthplace in Bantwal, South Kanara. To chronicle a few of his achievements:

- At 16 he contested and won the school student leader position in the final year of high school.
- He started INTUC (Indian National Trade Union Congress) to counter the Communist influence amongst the Bantwal Beedi laborers. He was not going to sit idle and discuss.
 He wanted something to be done about communist labor movement and he did it.



- He started Saraswathi Kala Pracharak Sangha, which created Saraswathi Sangeetha Shaala to streamline the training of talented people in classical music and instruments such as Tabla and Harmonium, in and around Bantwal. He himself was a student there for a while. He also started drama production and his dramas were permanent entertainments on the agenda during the Mahanavami Pooja period of 9 days.
- In 1977 he became the correspondent of SVS Schools in Bantwal.
- He managed Late Mr. Vaikunta
 Baliga's MLA election, canvassing
 machinery and brought a lot of
 high school students into the Con-

gress Party fold as volunteers by indoctrinating them against the evils of communist philosophy. Late Mr. T.A. Pai who was the president of the South Kanara Congress Party was so impressed that he offered Vaman Shenoy a job in Syndicate Bank in Panemangalore. Once he joined Syndicate Bank, there was no looking back. He helped innumerable youngsters from Bantwal get a job in Syndicate Bank, some of whom ended up in upper echelons of Syndicate Bank.

- He won awards for deposits canvassing every year for his category of the branches of Syndicate Bank.
 He was also promoted as Assistant Manager.
- Within 6-7 years he was awarded a manager's position in Raibag on the condition that he will go to that god forsaken village in Belgaum District and open a branch of Syndicate Bank in 1968. To put it



in perspective, what he got into when he accepted the challenge, this village was a Taluka headquarter in Belgaum District just like Bantwal was South Kanara. In Bantwal at that time there were 4 banks and Syndicate Bank alone had 96 taxi loans and Raibag had no taxis and only one 1939 model Vauxhall car. And one of the ministers in Karnataka State Government at that time hailed from and lived in Raibag. In spite of it, development was totally unknown. There was no toilet in that village for anybody. Men and women went to the hills to relieve themselves with a can of water. People would walk into the bank with bodyguards carrying guns like in the movies. They spoke a certain dialect of Marathi dominated Kannada, which none of the staff from South Kanara understood. That's how backward this village was. Infact,

en was a promotion. Despite all the challenges he went there with his family of 3 children, one of whom was barely 4 months old and his mother, who needed help to move.

But one year later, this branch won the national award in farm loans, number of loan accounts and the volume in rupees. That was his leadership quality.

- After 4 years when he left Raibag,
 it had a Cricket team, a recreation
 club with Table Tennis, Bingo Parlor
 and Cards room. He had raised the
 branch to the level of 12 employees.
 On the last day in Raibag, his farewell party was a memorable event in
 Raibag's history.
- Then he took over the management in Panemangalore. After a short stint in Panemangalore he became the manager of Bantwal. This is when he showed the world what it can do when there is a leader on a mission.



- He was instrumental in raising funds for performing Sahastra
 Kumbhabhishekha for the first time in Bantwal Temple's history.
- Support in creating a Silver Rath (Chariot) at the Bantwal Sri Venkataramana Swamy temple.
- Became the President (in Bantwal High School, that position is called Correspondent) of the SVS
 High School. In a very short span of time he built a new building with more than 10 rooms. Between 1950-70 there was no other addition to Bantwal High school. All these things happened in a span of 3-4 years.
- He became involved in Yashwanth
 Vyaayaamashaala which was close

to 100 years old but literally had become a non-existent institution due to lack of enthusiasm. He came in and rejuvenated the institution by bringing in talented students in Mall khamba and many other artistic performances that were unique to Bantwal Vyaayaamashaalaa. He took these students to give performances in Mysore Palace and many other places. In association with Kasturba Medical College he set up an "Outreach Specialist Clinic" in Vyayama Shala premises in 1988.

- In 1974 villages on the banks of River Netravati in Bantwal Taluk got submerged in the flood. Basti Vaman Shenoy took initiative in setting up several relief camps in the Taluk and supported the industry and trade activities by refinancing the traders through Syndicate Bank.
- Then he managed Syndicate Bank branches in Moodabidri, South Kanara, Shimoga, and Bangalore.



 From there he landed in Mangalore and he retired from Syndicate bank to become a proponent of Konkani Language.

It is hard to believe he was inspired by none other than Dr. B. M. Hegde, a non-Konkani who spoke Konkani as well as any other Konkani could, to create a World Konkani Center which will be open to all Konkanis irrespective of their religion whether they are Hindus, Muslims or Christians. Sometimes God sends a messenger to ignite the dormant fire in another of his creations. Dr. Hegde was that messenger. And Vaman Shenoy jumped with both feet. First, he started studying the history of Konkani Language and started meeting some of the authors in Konkani etc. and he organized a Vishwa Konkani

Convention in Mangalore. That convention hasn't been matched by any other till date. During that convention, he floated the idea of creating a World Center for Konkanis and creating a world organization for the Konkanis.

From that idea the **Vishwa Konkani Kendra** and **Vishwa Konkani**

Parishath were born. Against all odds, he stood by his dream of building the Konkani Center in Mangalore. Hundreds of people thought a plan with an outlay of 4 crore rupees will never get off the ground. But he proved the old dictum that says "ONE MAN WITH CONVICTION IS MAJORITY". During the sojourn in quest of money to complete the project, he visited America 4 times and Europe too only to be disappointed due to lack of support coming from the Konkanis in the USA. Getting disillusioned over other people's inability to share his dream was not his way of life. He kept going, meeting people in Dubai, Bombay and other major cities



and one fine morning the Vishwa Konkani Kendra became a reality. That building is testimonial to his grit and determination.

Nothing succeeds like success, they say. Then came major contributors in hoards because of the success of the first project of building the Konkani Kendra. And they also brought great ideas such as giving free scholarships to the Konkani Students. Today, everything over here works like a major US Corporation.


The program started with a beautiful rendition of invocation from Ganesh

14. Konkani Sammelan Update

Namaskaru,

We hope you and your family are staying safe and healthy! In this edition, we would like to update you about the Konkani Sammelan 2022.

We are happy to announce that we have decided to stay with the decision to hold the Konkani Sammelan from July 2nd to 4th, 2022, at San Jose McEnery Convention Center, San Jose, CA.

The Sammelan committee debated several scenarios before arriving at this decision:

For the planned convention in 2020, we had negotiated the best rates with the convention center and hotels, which included a particular contract to have our own catered Amchigele food in the convention center. These deals were critical for our ability to hold a convention in the Bay Area and possible through prolonged negotiations and follow-ups. We have held on to these rates through contract extensions in the last two years. The convention center and the hotels have opened for normal operations now, and we would have incurred a loss of over \$160K by canceling the Sammelan.

- We are encouraged by the speedy recovery from the pandemic leading to the opening of domestic and international travel and a full spectrum of indoor and outdoor activities. The sports activities have already been in full swing since last year. Several conventions (such as Marathi, Odisha, Havyaka, etc.) and concerts (such as Arjit Singh, Atif Aslam, Aman Malik, Shankar Mahadevan, etc.) have already been announced for the Summer of 2022.
- Many Konkani families have shown overwhelming enthusiasm to attend the in-person events and participate in online events. We plan to make the programs interactive for more people to connect, after a long break of 2 years.

The committee is swinging into full gear in its preparations for the Sammelan. You will receive weekly emails with details on entertainment, seminars, etc.

Entertainment, Seminars and Food


